Journal of Mattie W. Groasdale

One treasure I discovered recently in our archives: a simple journal of beige cloth bound pages belonging to Mattie W. Croasdale. It seems Mattie W. Croasdale was at the Excelsior Normal School, also referenced as the "E.N. Institute", in Carversville in the 1860s. The pages of her journal contain numerous notes collected from fellow students as well as local residents and classmates from as far away as New York and New Hampshire. Each seemingly an autograph written in beautiful script, signed and often dated.

Many spoke of faith and learning. One page I appreciated reading was penned by the original resident of my current home in the Carversville Historic District.

Seek to elevate thy mind. – George Betts, MD, 1st July 1864

Others took a political tone with references to being, "An advocate of true Democracy" and "Respectfully "Republican". "The safety of our country rests upon Gen Grant, at present. Not upon Abe's Election."

Messages both somber and uplifting are found in this collection. Some fill the pages while others are a simple quip.

Mattie, There are few things sadder than a life without purpose. - Your Friend, Horace Mitchner May every blessing be thy lot. I only ask Forget me not. -Attie Glosson, Feb 21st 1866, Garversville Mattie, Seek upward, God is there and when though ask'st will receive thee. Seek onward, for in thy future a wreath of laurel will be found to crown thee. -Thy true friend, Grace A. Gadwallader To friend Mattie, Life is but a transient dream. And full of trials doth seam. Whatever be our Lot on earth, Let virtue be our aim. _Abraham Fretz, Newton, N.J., December 1868 Mattie, Mourn no more the loved and lost, Keep back the falling tears, For God has promised in his word The orphan's cry to hear. -Kindly Yours, Emily E.H. Tomlinson (of Mitchell, Towa) There is no happiness on earth, Like that of sunny youth; It's joys seem of a Heavenly birth, A gem of love and truth. – Truly yours
Alfred frackenthall, Ottsville, Bucks Co., La August 18th 64 As the ripple follows the bark, to Mattie may happiness follow thee. -Truly Thine, Lizzie L'Orin, Avondale, Chester Co, Lennşylvania, January 14, 1865

The reader gets a sense of life here at that time for a young woman. Perhaps also that of her admirers.

Dear Mattie, You ask of me a long piece, which I would willingly grant, if it were possible. Mattie remember the many pleasant times we have had at the Normal this summer. And when far away if thy thoughts should wander back to the time that you and I took a walk one evening, of the call that we made. And the introduction into fashionable society where the refreshments were splendid' -Ever Yours, H.A. Mathews, 8/8/64 Dear Mattie, Nothing will do you say but an original piece... Advice I will not give you for other friends have already given a sufficient amount to make you happy if guarded by it. When other friends and duties surround you, I would have you lend a few passing thoughts to a certain scene in which a particular person stood pleading as if his life depended on the answer, and I am sure you will remember me. -A Silent Observer, Brownsburg.

These last ones offer intriguing references, "inside jokes" of today, reminiscent of my own high school year book from 1982, one hundred years later. Though my classmates were not nearly as eloquent nor was their handwriting so beautiful.

And lastly, Remember youth well spent, makes old age pleasant. - Yours with respect, James R. Agnew, Erwinna, Lenna

















Celebrating Future Leaders: HCS Scholarship Winners for 2025
